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President's Message

Hello, everyone, I hope you are happy that the groundhog didn't see his shadow this time. I am enjoying the warmer weather we are having at the time of this writing.

MCB has several things going on at the present time. We have had the Braille writers donated by Ms. Betty Dement cleaned and repaired. These will be donated to blind students attending public schools. These Braille students only have access to a Braille writer at school and have no way to practice Braille writing out of the classroom. Also, Ms. Patricia Austin has told me she wants to donate Gary's Braille writers to us for the same purpose. I would like to thank both of these ladies for helping us to help others.

MCB received the funds from the New York Life annuity in December, and this money has been reinvested at Trustmark Bank. \$100,000 was placed in an eight-month CD at 5% interest. The remainder, around \$97,000, was placed in a money market account at 5% interest.

A new one-page flyer has been composed to be printed on a regular home printer as needed for distribution when the opportunity is available.

Our web site is in the process of being updated by Mr. Jeremy Johanson. Jeremy administers several sites for various ACB groups. Alison Smitherman has very graciously agreed to be our contact person with Jeremy to be sure our website is up-to-date and accurate.

MCB will have a one-day convention on April 27th at the Holiday Inn Trustmark Park in Pearl, MS. Registration will include the cost of the hot served luncheon and will be \$25. A block of rooms will be reserved for those who might wish to stay at the hotel. The room rate is \$129 per day plus taxes. The cutoff date for reservations is April 1. Zanagrams

Zanagrams is a word puzzle game available from the app store. There is an initial free version. Each game has six clues; the clues are at random. Below the six clues you will find a grid of letter tracks. The letter tracks are in two or three letter combinations; for example, you might find, er, ing, ent, us. You

will choose the corresponding track for the particular clue. Now, you may ask what makes this puzzle interesting? Well, this word game works with VoiceOver. When you are playing the game and you choose a particular letter track, that track is taken off of the letter grid. Of course, you will have the option to purchase other puzzles, however, you can enjoy the free version until you complete all of the games. Some clues are easier than others. It is good to know that some app developers are making their products accessible! When you play you can also shuffle the letter grid. The free version contains two word puzzle categories, namely, Word Salad and Outer Space. If you enjoy word games, you will like this one.

<u>Demon and David - Book Review</u> by Linda Adams

Barbara Kingsolver's Pulitzer winning novel, Demon Copperhead (DB110786) was based on Charles Dickens' David Copperfield. Kingsolver set the story in current time and placed it in the coal mining area of Appalachia. The publisher's comments on BARD give an excellent overview of the book on which I could not improve, so, read that for plot details. My comments in this article are from interviews by the author, including one she gave locally that I was pleased to attend. Kingsolver and her husband were on a book tour in England and

had the opportunity to stay in the home where Dickens wrote David Copperfield. She was between books and thought "What if?" Kingsolver, herself, was raised in and now lives in the Appalachian area of Southwest Virginia. In "Demon" she has written about today's challenges faced by small rural communities, especially where financial decline has occurred. Kingsolver discussed the difference between "rural poverty" and "city poverty." In the first instance, you may be barefoot but will have food whereas in the city, it can be the opposite. Kingsolver described how she used names in her novel that reflect those in Dickens' novel. For example, David Copperfield becomes Damon Field whose nickname is Demon Copperhead, because of his red hair. Another example is Dicken' villain, Uriah Heep becomes Ryan Pyles (nickname U-Haul). Reading David Copperfield before Demon is not necessary, but I did so to prepare leading my neighborhood's book discussion. Certain that I must have read it many years ago, by Chapter 3 I decided that if so, I had forgotten most of it or was I just thinking of "Catcher in the Rye!" Both Copperhead and Copperfield are long books, 21+ hours and 38+ hours respectively, but worth the investment.

On a non-literary note, Kingsolver performed with the Rock Bottom Remainders Band along with authors Stephen King, Dave Barry, Ridley Pearson and others. Kingsolver and Amy Tan both performed with the band as lead vocalist. The band's first performance was in 1992 and they performed at the opening of the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in 1995. Sadly, they no longer perform but with a little effort, you may be successful in tracking down one of their CDs.
